Monday, April 23, 2018, 6:30 PM

Call to Order: Meeting was called to order at 6:35 p.m.

#### Minutes of February 27, 2018 Meeting

Anthony O'Donnel made a motion to accept the minutes of the February 27th meeting, Pat Donahue seconded. AIF.

#### **Price Increases for Burials:**

Kelly Ryan provided the Commission with the proposed price increase list. The last price increase was in 2014.

After discussion, Pat Donahue made a motion to accept the changes in funding for cemetery expenses including that Greenlawn Cemetery will no longer accept personal checks. Seconded by Gordon Wilkins. AIF with Anthony O'Donnell abstaining. The pricing change is effective May 1, 2018 and Kelly will make changes as voted on and email Commission members the new price list and an example of the letter which will be sent to funeral directors. #### Greenlawn Cemetery Cleanup April 1, 2018:

With the inclement weather, cleanup began April 15, 2018 and was posted in the Salem News. The rules of etiquette are conspicuously posted in Greenlawn Cemetery in both English and Spanish and site owners are given a copy of these rules at the purchase. The Cemetery Commission requests that the Rules of Etiquette be enforced by the Assistant Director, Sean McCrea and his employees.

A notice posted on the bulletin board outside the cemetery office was suggested. If workers encounter problems they can suggest a letter be sent to the Cemetery Commission..

Fishing will not be allowed in Greenlawn Cemetery, and any violation shall be liable to a fine not exceeding \$50.00.

#### **Liaison For Cemetery Commission**

Mayor Driscoll will look for a liaison within the City to assist the Commission with contacts, information, etc. Sean is also willing to provide us with assistance.

#### Anticipated Future Usage for Greenlawn Burials

For the next Commission meeting, Sean will:

- When was the Berk lot opened and surveyed
- How many lots remain before another section needs to be opened.
- Columbarium possible

#### Algae Growth on Sargeant Pond

Charlie Lipson discussed the excessive algae growth at Sargeant Pond caused by duck and goose poop. There are two areas contributing to this problem. He suggested a small sign at each site to discourage the excessive feeding. (Attachment 2a, 2b, and 2c)

# Feeding Waterfowl

## FEEDING WATERFOWL

Feeding waterfowl can create many problems for the birds as well as for the environment. This practice is discouraged by Audubon Society of Portland. The notion that waterfowl cannot survive without human intervention is false. Ducks and geese have survived for thousands of years without handouts, and today many species of waterfowl are thriving. In fact, many of our urban parks are now over-populated with ducks and geese. Please enjoy our local waterfowl but view them from a distance and respect their wildness. By doing so, you will provide them with their best chance for survival.

Reasons not to feed waterfowl:

1. Feeding waterfowl can quickly lead to overpopulation problems at small urban and suburban parks. Left on their own, ducks and geese will occupy areas that provide sufficient natural food. When local resources are low or depleted, individuals will move to new locations. Increasingly, our urban and suburban parks are home to year-round resident populations of waterfowl that remain static because of the endless food

supply provided by well-meaning humans. Many of our parks are plagued with sick and injured ducks that are a direct result of the intensive aggression and competition that occurs when waterfowl populations become concentrated. The Care Center receives dozens of severely injured female ducks each spring that have been attacked by gangs of aggressive drakes (male ducks). We also receive dozens of reports each spring of female mallards nesting far (sometimes more than a mile) from the nearest water source. This is a direct response to their inability to successfully incubate and raise young in our overpopulated parks.

2. Feeding waterfowl can lead to severe habitat degradation. Providing food quickly attracts concentrations of waterfowl beyond what the natural ecosystem can support. Large concentrations of waterfowl can reduce water quality and de-vegetate natural areas. Concentrating large populations of waterfowl into small natural areas is not a sustainable strategy. As numbers increase, natural forage will decrease and individuals will only become more depen-

dent upon handouts.

3. Feeding can cause waterfowl to lose their natural fear of humans.

For many wild animals, survival is



contingent upon maintaining a healthy fear of humans. Feeding waterfowl can quickly cause them to lose their instinctive sense of fear. While the food provider may have the best of intentions, the ducks still have to survive in a world filled with hazards. In an urban landscape full of dogs, cats, cars, and people, the duck or goose that maintains its innate wildness ultimately has the best chance for survival.
