The City of Salem has been awarded a Parkland Acquisitions and Renovations for Communities Grant from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Community Development Block Grant funding and Community Preservation Act funding to complete improvements to the park that were identified by the community.

Planned improvements include an enhanced entrance, upgraded play equipment, a universally designed walking path, new trees and improvements to the basketball court and softball field.

A public meeting will take place to share the planned upgrades, on Tuesday May 16, 6:45 p.m. at the Park & Recreation Commission meeting at 5 Broad Street.


At the meeting, Landscape Architect Naomi Cottrell of Michelle Crowley Landscape Ar-

## **EXISALEM** Canal Street Partial Closure

As part of the on-going Canal St. Roadway Improvement Project, MassDOT and the project contractors will be closing a roughly 600' length of Canal St. to through traffic for a total time period of 12 weeks.

May 30-July 18: no through traffic possible from Ocean Ave to Hersey St. Detours will be posted allowing through traffic to travel through the corridor via Laurel St, Linden St, and Forest Ave. Hersey St is proposed to be temporarily a 2-way street to allow vehicles to access Canal St businesses from the Linden St detour.

#### July 18-August 22: no through

traffic possible from Hersey St to Forest Ave. Detours will be posted allowing through traffic to travel through the corridor via Broadway and Ocean Ave.

In anticipation of the detour traffic the City will level and pave some of the detour streets in the neighborhood adjacent to Canal St. All Canal St businesses will be open for business during this time period, with the exception of McDonalds, which will temporarily close to carry out a large renovation project. Please help support our Canal St businesses during this important roadway improvement project.

While the rest of the Canal Street Roadway Improvement Project can be accomplished while allowing through traffic to continue, the state of deterioration under the roadway in this one 600' stretch is substantial. To reconstruct the roadway in a manner that will provide the most long-lasting improvement, the contractor will be excavating to 30" below the road surface, more than twice the standard excavation depth. The roadway will be filled with a light concrete fill, instead of conventional fill, and a stabilizing high-strength geo-tech fabric will then be installed over the top of the fill from curb to curb. A final paving layer will then go over the geo-tech fabric.

The deterioration of this portion of the roadway has occurred as peat and loose soils under the pavement have consolidated and sunk over time, while underground utilities such as storm drains and con-

Saturday, June 17, 9:30 a.m. duits have kept the road surface elevated in places. The resulting roadway surface is highly uneven. The more substantial improvement possible through this temporary closure will help eliminate this problem on a more longterm basis than conventional methods.

## Salem PowerChoice

Beginning with June electricity meter reads, participants in the Salem PowerChoice program will see their rates lower for a second time in 2017. PowerChoice Standard, which provides 100% green energy, will lower to 9.965 cents/kWh. PowerChoice Plus, which provides 100%-green energy and includes an extra 20% from renewable energy projects in New England, will lower to 10.065 cents/kWh. PowerChoice Basic, which does not integrate any additional renewable energy, will lower to 9.92 cents/kWh.

"By committing to a two-year contract, the City has locked in a price that will not only remain stable for those two years, but also has the potential to protect program participants from any future increases in electricity costs," said Salem Mayor Kimberley Driscoll. "At the same time, we have reaffirmed our City's commitment to sustainability leadership in Massachusetts. Salem Power-Choice continues to integrate 100%-green energy and has already reduced the City's carbon footprint dramatically. Based on a combination of actual and estimated electricity use, Salem will have reduced its carbon footprint by more than 39,000 tons since program launch, the equivalent of taking more than 7,500 vehicles off the road for one year."

Salem PowerChoice takes advantage of bulk purchasing electricity for the entire community. Through this program, Salem is working to make electricity costs more predictable and more stable, to bring 100% green energy to the City, and to give participants more control over the price and environmental characteristics of the electricity they use.


The program offers three alternatives to National Grid Basic Service:

- PowerChoice Standard is 100% green and is the default offering. New National Grid Basic Service customers in Salem are automatically enrolled in PowerChoice Standard, unless they choose to opt out.
- PowerChoice Plus is an option that allows participants to make their electricity supply 100% green with a focus on locally produced renewable energy. PowerChoice Plus includes an extra 20% from renewable energy projects in New England, in addition to the minimum required by the state. Participants may choose PowerChoice Plus for a small premium.
- PowerChoice Basic is the least expensive option within the program. PowerChoice Basic meets minimum state renewable energy requirements, but it does not include any additional renewable energy.

The new prices will be in effect from June 2017 meter reads until June 2019 meter reads. During that time, National Grid Basic Service prices will fluctuate and may at times be lower or higher than the program price, although the PowerChoice price is expected to be lower than the Basic Service price in total over the course of the entire two-year contract. Customers always have the right to leave, or opt out, of the program at any time with no penalty.
