I'm excited to announce that the City has received a \$1 million state grant from the Seaport Economic Council. Most of these funds will be directed toward improvements at Salem Wharf and the adjacent deepwater berth, while the rest will be used to fund our upcoming Harbor Plan, which will engage neighbors and the community in a long-term vision for the harbor area.

Read more in this issue about the recently launched ecigarette and vape pen buyback program, which the City is undertaking through a partnership between our Health Department, the Salem Youth Commission, North Shore Community Health, the Salem Public Schools, and North Shore Medical Center.

From the Mayor's Desk

There are two upcoming events that may be of interest to you. On March 23rd an expert in the "tiny house" movement will conduct a presentation at the Community Life Center. And, on March 28th, SalemRecycles will again host their recurring Repair Café event at 211 Bridge Street.

The Bridge Street complete streets project, which runs on Bridge Street from Flint Street to Boston and includes the Boston/ Bridge Street intersection, is gearing up to begin this spring. Find a link in this issue to the project website, where you can find project plans and get the regular two-week look-ahead updates that will be issued once the project commences.

Finally, we wrap up the newspaper—as we always do—with some important updates from the Salem Public Schools, including information about the ongoing Salem High School principal search and a major workforce grant just awarded to Salem High School for the culinary arts and medical assisting programs there.

On the most recent FYI Salem podcast I sat down with Valerie Fletcher from the Institute for Human Centered Design, the organization that completed the City's new ADA plan. 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Harbor Grant



On February 25th the Economic Council was announced that the City of Salem had received a grant totaling \$1 million to support the on-going work on Salem Harbor. The grant will support two specific initiatives.

Salem Wharf Deepwater Berth Repair - \$840,000 This funding will help the City of Salem identify and implement near-term improvements necessary to maintain func-

tionality of the Salem Wharf Deepwater Berth, and if nearterm improvements are not practicable, or do not require the full requested funding, then funding will be used to begin an assessment of long-term rehabilitation and/or reconstruction of the wharf.

Salem Municipal Harbor Planning - \$160,000

This funding will allow the City of Salem to embark on a harbor planning and community visioning effort that will revise the Salem Harbor Plan to address significant changes that have occurred both along Salem's waterfront and in how the City approaches waterfront development in consideration of climate change and sea level rise. The Salem Harbor Plan will serve as a basis for the City and the Commonwealth to employ a shared approach to the development and regulation of waterfront areas subject to public rights and interests.

"This grant award will support critical efforts along Salem's historic and vibrant waterfront," said Mayor Kim Driscoll. "For over a decade we have focused on establishing Salem's historic port as a central part of our economic strength and our community's vitality. Our connection to our waterfront is and always has been one of Salem's defining assets and greatest economic forces. We have enlivened our port with new industries, recreational amenities, tourism opportunities, and alternative transportation options. This latest Seaport Economic Council grant award will be especially beneficial as we work to expand Salem Harbor's facilities and increase visitation to our City by water."

Vape Buy-Back

The City of Salem, in partnership with North Shore Community Health and North Shore Medical Center, has launched a new initiative to encourage high school age youth to give up vaping. Salem youth can bring their e-cigarette device or vape pen to the Teen Health Center at Salem High School (Suite 127) and receive a \$50 gift card to Target, Market Basket, Stop & Shop, or other area businesses.

To receive the gift card, students must also participate in and successfully complete four vaping cessation support sessions. The sessions are 45 minutes long and will take place in the Teen Health Center.

"The negative health effects from vaping are clearly established, so I hope all Salem kids who might use these potentially deadly devices will consider bringing it in for the buy-back," said Salem Mayor Kim Driscoll. "By coupling the gift card with cessation services, we're also hoping to help youth successfully break the vaping habit for good, too."

Schools Updates

The Amazing Shake

Bates Elementary will host the Amazing Shake Competition starting on Tuesday, March 10th. The Amazing Shake is a contest that places an emphasis on teaching students manners, discipline, respect, and professional conduct.

Through the Amazing Shake, a competition originally created by the Ron Clark Academy in Atlanta, Georgia, students are introduced to the nuances of professional human interaction as they are taught various skills such as how to give a proper handshake, how to



provide high-quality answers in interviews, and how to remain composed under pressure. At the end of the contest, the school aims to prepare their students to present themselves exceptionally well for opportunities today as well as those that will come in the future.

Salem High School Principal Search

The process for hiring a high school principal is on target and on time. Survey responses from students, faculty, and the community were used to develop a profile for what the screening committee should look for in the new hire. 18 applicants are currently being screened and a group of semifinalists will be chosen. Interviews for the semifinalists will take place the week of 3/9-3/11 and finalists will be announced once that process is complete.

Skills Capital Grant

Congrats to Salem High School for being awarded the Massachusetts Skills Capital Grant! The Massachusetts Skills Capital Grant award money will be used for the purchase and installation of equipment and the related improvements and renovations necessary to support vocational and technical training. This equipment will upgrade and expand career technical education and training programs that are aligned to regional economic and workforce development priorities for in-demand industries and to provide students training pathways to career opportunities in high-skill, high-demand industry sectors. At Salem High School the \$218,000 award will be used to obtain equipment for our Culinary Arts and Medical Assisting programs.
