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From the Mayor's Desk



Dear Salem resident,

As of yesterday, April 29th, 21,514 Salem residents have received at least one shot of the COVID-19 vaccine. While we've made remarkable progress in just a few short months, we know there is still more work to do.

We're encouraged by the positive trends in the public health data and the increasing numbers of vaccinated residents.

Nevertheless as a community that has a large visitor population we want to be extremely cautious and thoughtful in our approach to reopening.

Over the next several days our own local experts and Board of Health members will be reviewing the state's recently announced reopening proce-

dures and evaluating which, if any, of our own local health orders may be modified as a result.

We continue to encourage visitors to Salem to follow all posted guidance, to wear masks and practice social distancing, and to be respectful of our local businesses and their employees. And, as always, we also encourage all residents to get the COVID vaccine as soon as possible. The more of us who are vaccinated, the faster we'll all be able to get back to normal.

North Shore Community Health recently held a mobile clinic at the Salem Academy Charter School and the City's mobile vaccination program for homebound residents is nearly complete.

We also recently received the good news that the state has finally approved our regional vaccine clinic, proposed for Salem State University's O'Keefe Center. Once that site opens, which we expect to happen in early May, thousands of additional vaccination appointments will become available to our residents.

In addition to all these options, the federal pharmacy vaccination sites continue to grow in number and available appointments. Where it had been difficult and frustrating to book a vaccine appointment just a couple of months ago, today it's growing easier every day. And, if you're hesitant or reluctant to get the COVID vaccine, please know that it has been tested by thousands and taken by millions. Until enough of us have the vaccine, we won't be able to get back to all activities we used to enjoy and we won't be able to safely see our friends, family, and loved ones.

It's on us to put this pandemic behind us. Please—get the vaccine, any one of the authorized vaccines, as soon as you are able. And then, continue to wear your mask, practice safe distancing, and be respectful of one another.

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Regional Vaccine Clinic

The City of Salem, in partnership with the Cities of Beverly, Lynn, and Peabody and the Towns of Danvers, Marblehead, Nahant, Saugus, and Swampscott, have been notified by the Commonwealth that their application to host a regional COVID-19 vaccination clinic site at Salem State University's O'Keefe Center has been approved.

When: Dates and times are TBA and will be posted at www.salem.com/vaccine.

Who is eligible: Clinic is open to all Massachusetts residents over the age of 16.

How to get an appointment? To book an appointment at this site click the "North Shore Regional Vaccination Clinic" link at www.salem.com/vaccine once it is listed on that page. Appointments will be subject to the availability of vaccine doses, which are provided by the state.

"As we work to expand access and equity in vaccine distribution, this regional clinic site will help to better serve the tens of thousands of North Shore residents who are in need of and seeking this critical vaccine," said Mayor Driscoll. "We are stronger and safer as a region when we work to ensure the public health of all our residents. By providing access to the COVID vaccine, free of charge and to anyone – whether or not they have health insurance and regardless of immigration status – we can move closer to the day when the pandemic is finally over."

You can pre-register for an appointment at a Mass Vax site or book a specific appointment time at a regional clinic, pharmacy, or through some healthcare providers. Find more information about all these options at www.salem.com/vaccine. You don't need to show proof of citizenship to get the vaccine. While health insurance isn't required either, if you do have it you may be asked to provide your health insurance information when you get your vaccine.



Arbor Day

Salem will celebrate Arbor Day on Friday, April 30 at the Bates School where third graders will assist Tree Warden Bob LeBlanc and Mayor Kim Driscoll in planting an *Acer rubrum* 'October Glory' on the school grounds. As part of the event, students will learn about the benefits of trees and will be given spruce seedlings to plant either at home or at Forest River Park with the guidance of the Tree Warden.

Arbor Day, which is part of the Tree City USA program, is celebrated in 3,400 communities across the USA. For the past fifteen years, Salem has been recog-

nized by this program for its commitment to planting and nurturing trees.

"I am so proud of our tradition of planting trees and reaching out to students on Arbor Day," said Mayor Driscoll.

"Trees not only improve the quality of life in our City, they also provide important environmental benefits. It's gratifying that we're able to pass on to future generations an appreciation for this vital natural resource."

July 4th Update

Based on the state's recently announced restrictions on the number of people who can gather outdoors and after discussions with the National Park Service – which hosts Salem's annual July 4th celebration at Derby Wharf – the City of Salem has announced that the traditional July 4th celebration of fireworks and a large concert will not take place this summer. On July 4th the state's limitations on outdoor gathering sizes will be 250 individuals, far below the many thousands who normally attend Salem's Independence Day celebration. Instead, this year a special celebratory fireworks display is tentatively planned for Heritage Days in August.

"We continue to do all that we can to keep our community safe for everyone," said Mayor Kim Driscoll. "Unfortunately, even with the improving public health metrics, we will not be in a place where the City or the National Park Service believes we

will be able to safely gather on Derby Wharf in July. It's far too important that we continue to slow the spread of COVID. We are looking forward to welcoming everyone back to our historic waterfront to celebrate on July 4, 2022."

The City invites residents to celebrate America's independence on July 4th this year by hanging an American flag from their porch or house, decorating their home or business, and sharing images of their personal celebration of the day by posting to social media with the hashtag #SalemCelebratesJuly4th. As a reminder, the use of fireworks is illegal in Salem and, around July 4th, fines are increased for illegal fireworks. Avoid the risk of serious injury to yourself or your loved ones, and the risk of significant fines. Do not detonate fireworks in Salem.
